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Management Discussion of Fund Performance

June 3, 2022

This Management Discussion of Fund Performance presents the portfolio management team's view on the significant factors and developments that have affected the ETF's performance and outlook in the year ended March 31, 2022 (the "period"). If the ETF was established during the period, "period" represents the period since inception.

In this report, "Mackenzie" and "the Manager" refer to Mackenzie Financial Corporation, the manager of the ETF. In addition, net asset value ("NAV") refers to the value of the ETF as calculated for subscription and redemption purposes, on which the discussion of ETF performance is based.

Investment Objective and Strategies

The ETF seeks long-term capital growth, consistent with protection of capital, by investing primarily in a broad range of equities within developed markets anywhere in the world. The ETF's investments may include investments in emerging markets, and securities of U.S. companies will usually form the largest percentage of assets from any geographic area.

Risk

The risks of the ETF remain as discussed in the ETF's Prospectus.

The ETF is suitable for medium- to long-term investors looking for a global equity fund to hold as part of their portfolio, who can handle the volatility of stock markets and who have a low to medium tolerance for risk.

Results of Operations

Investment Performance

During the period, the ETF returned 2.7% (after deducting fees and expenses). This compares with the MSCI World (Net) Index return of 9.5%. All index returns are calculated on a total return basis in Canadian dollar terms. Investors cannot invest in an index without incurring fees, expenses and commissions, which are not reflected in the index returns.

Global markets generally rose but were volatile over the period. Lockdowns related to new COVID-19 variants caused chaotic economic reopening as semiconductor, commodity and labour shortages negatively affected supply chains. Russia's invasion of Ukraine disrupted energy markets, particularly in the eurozone. Several advanced economies had annual inflation above 5%, the highest in more than two decades. The period ended with a massive investor rotation out of growth stocks, which are relatively sensitive to interest rates, and into lower-priced value stocks.

Within the MSCI World (Net) Index, Norway, Canada and Denmark were the strongest-performing markets in Canadian dollar terms, while Ireland, New Zealand and Hong Kong were the weakest. The energy, information technology and real estate sectors were the strongest performers, while communication services, industrials and consumer discretionary were the weakest.

The ETF underperformed the index, with holdings in China and stock selection in the Netherlands detracting from performance. In sector terms, stock selection in consumer discretionary, health care and consumer staples detracted from performance, as did lack of exposure to energy.

Conversely, stock selection in the United States and Switzerland contributed to performance. In sector terms, stock selection in financials and communication services contributed to performance.

Over the period, the ETF's exposure to information technology stocks in the United States increased as the market sell-off late in the period made valuations more attractive, in the portfolio management team's view.

Net Assets

The ETF's net assets increased by 6.7% during the period to \$30.7 million. This change was composed primarily of \$0.7 million in net income (including any interest and/or dividend income) from investment performance, after deducting fees and expenses, and an increase of \$1.2 million due to net unitholder activity (including sales, redemptions and cash distributions).

At March 31, 2022, 11.3% of the ETF's NAV was held as inventory by the ETF's designated broker primarily for the purpose of sales to investors in the secondary market. As a result of these investments, the ETF is subject to large transaction risk as discussed in the Prospectus. Mackenzie manages this risk to reduce the possibility of any adverse effect on the ETF or on its investors, through such processes as settling transactions in kind, charging creation and/or redemption fees for transactions settling in cash, and establishing appropriate order cut-off times for transactions.

Recent Developments

Ongoing uncertainty regarding the duration and long-term impact of the COVID-19 pandemic and the effectiveness of vaccines against new variants of the virus contributes to uncertainty regarding the timing of a full economic recovery. As a result, it is not possible to reliably estimate the impact of the pandemic on the financial results and condition of the ETF in future periods.

Broad equity market weakness in the final three months muted returns for the period. Equity valuations remained rich and expectations for market returns remained high, but the portfolio management team believes both will be tested by central bank responses to inflation. Central banks in the United States, the United Kingdom and Canada were among the first to raise their benchmark interest rates, and bond yields jumped in many countries. The war in Ukraine added to inflationary pressures and uncertainty, and the team believes that the war could slow global economic growth.

The team focuses on striking an appropriate balance in the portfolio between short-term protection and long-term returns. With global markets near all-time highs, the team retains its valuation discipline while seeking out high-quality businesses that it believes can grow carefully over time.

Effective September 22, 2021, Atul Tiwari was appointed to the Mackenzie Funds' Independent Review Committee.

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Related Party Transactions

Management Fees

The management expense ratio (“MER”) for the ETF during the year ended March 31, 2022, was similar to the MER for the year ended March 31, 2021. Total expenses paid vary from period to period mainly as a result of changes in average assets in the ETF. The MERs are presented in the *Financial Highlights* section of this report. The ETF paid management fees to the Manager at the annual rate of 0.75%.

The management fee for the ETF is calculated and accrued daily as a percentage of its NAV. The ETF’s management fees were used by the Manager to pay for the costs of managing the investment portfolio of the ETF, including providing investment analysis and recommendations, making investment decisions, making brokerage arrangements for the purchase and sale of the investment portfolio and providing other services, and to pay for all costs and expenses (other than certain specified fund costs as more fully described in the Prospectus) required to operate the ETF.

Other Related Party Transactions

Investment funds managed by Mackenzie and its affiliates may invest in the ETF in accordance with the investment objectives of those funds. At March 31, 2022, funds managed by Mackenzie owned 7.6% of the ETF’s NAV. All related party transactions are based on the current market price. As a result of these investments, the ETF may be subject to large transaction risk as discussed in the Prospectus. Mackenzie manages this risk to reduce the possibility of any adverse effects on the ETF or on its investors, through such processes as settling transactions in kind, charging creation and/or redemption fees for transactions settling in cash, and establishing appropriate order cut-off time for transactions.

The ETF did not rely on an approval, positive recommendation or standing instruction from the Mackenzie Funds’ Independent Review Committee with respect to any related party transactions in the period.

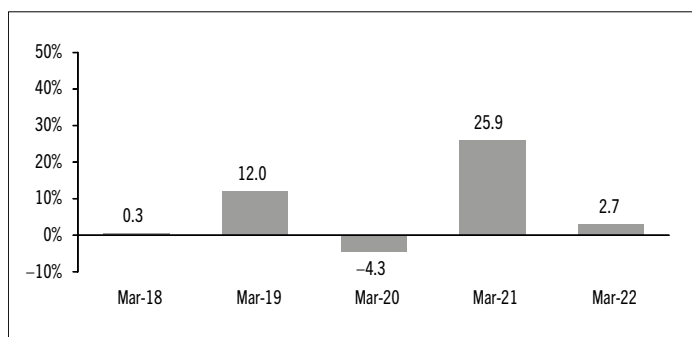
Past Performance

The ETF’s past performance information is presented in the following chart and table. It assumes all distributions made by the ETF in the periods presented are reinvested in additional units of the ETF. The chart and table do not take into account brokerage commissions or income taxes payable by any investor that would have reduced returns. The past performance of the ETF is not necessarily an indication of how it will perform in the future.

- Management expense ratio ("MER") is based on total expenses, excluding commissions and other portfolio transaction costs, income taxes and withholding taxes, for the stated period and is expressed as an annualized percentage of daily average net assets during the period, except as noted. If the ETF was established in the period, the MER is annualized from the date of inception to the end of the period. Where the ETF directly invests in securities of another fund (including other ETFs), the MER presented for the ETF includes the portion of MERs of the other fund(s) attributable to this investment. Any income distributions received from ETFs managed by the Manager, with the intention of offsetting fees paid within those ETFs but which are not considered to be duplicative fees under regulatory requirements, are treated as waived expenses for MER purposes. The Manager may waive or absorb operating expenses at its discretion and stop waiving or absorbing such expenses at any time without notice.
- The trading expense ratio ("TER") represents total commissions and other portfolio transaction costs expressed as an annualized percentage of daily average net assets during the period. Where the ETF invests in securities of another fund (including other ETFs), the TER presented for the ETF includes the portion of TERs of the other fund(s) attributable to this investment. Mackenzie may reimburse the ETF for certain brokerage commissions and other transaction costs (including those payable to the custodian or its agents). Mackenzie may make these reimbursements at its discretion and stop these reimbursements at any time without notice.
- The ETF's portfolio turnover rate indicates how actively the ETF's portfolio advisor manages its portfolio investments. A portfolio turnover rate of 100% is equivalent to the ETF buying and selling all of the securities in its portfolio once in the course of the period. The higher the ETF's portfolio turnover rate in a period, the greater the trading costs payable by the ETF in the period, and the greater the chance of an investor receiving taxable capital gains in the year. There is not necessarily a relationship between a high turnover rate and the performance of the ETF. The portfolio turnover rate is not provided when the ETF is less than one year old.
